President's Message

My apologies. The newsletter is late in fact very late. Towards the end of April, we received a letter from the funding body responsible for administration of the Stronger Country Community Grant that our first payment had been paused. This created some difficulty because some preparatory work had been started at Hazelgrove. This grant was for:

- Restoration of the turnaround loop at the Hazelwood site
- Development of a station platform which will reflect previous construction methods and appearance.
- Development of a picnic area adjacent to the station platform with concrete pathways, a shelter shed, gas BBQs and toilet with disabled access

On Friday we received notice that "the pause on executing new contracts has now lifted". We can now proceed with the Hazelgrove improvements.

Parts of the Black Summer Bushfire Recovery Grant are progressing well, in particular the new walkway at the southern end of the station. The earthworks and retaining wall are nearly complete and the concreter should be able to start work in the next fortnight.

This week two specialist carriage workers from the Lithgow Rail Workshop commenced work on the timber framing carriage HS36. It is skilful, slow and repetitive work. We are pleased with the completed work. They will be on site this week 15th – 19th May. We have a report on page 10 on the progress on HLF854.

I was asked to give a presentation on "The journey to re-open the Oberon Tarana Branch Line as a Tourist Facility" at the Blue Mountains Association of Cultural Heritage Organisations (BMACHO) on May 6th. The preparation involved going back through archival material to get some feeling on what it was really like when the first committee met in 2005 and then when the first working bee occurred in 2006.

The archives had an excellent photographic record of the early working bees and how so much was achieved. Waist high weeds, parts of the track buried in dirt, cattle grids and culverts that needed to be replaced. You will see a few of the photos as you read through this newsletter.

**Noted in an emailed
Newsletter compiled by

“Last December, the Society was offered a right – hand turnout point, together with a significant amount of rail from what had been the RDI (formerly Clyde Engineering originally) facility at Kelso, near Bathurst. The EI Workshops had closed several years ago, and the site has since been sold for redevelopment for several manufacturing facilities. The former siding and turnout was not required and was donated to OTHR on the basis that the Society dismantle the track. Both has since been delivered to Oberon, with the point subsequently being taken down to Hazelgrove. A left-hand point was obtained from near Gilgandra, being taken down to Hazelgrove on 25/03.

The two points will be installed into the recently reconstructed main line at the proposed interim terminus at Hazelgrove, replacing the original points which were removed/recovered prior to the society taking over the line. Installation will allow the construction of a locomotive run – round facility at this location – as covered more fully in the coverage in last month’s Email Newsletter.

Interestingly, OTHR does not propose to ballast the reconstructed line, “so is retain its heritage authenticity.” Close examination of my photos from the operating era do disclose absolutely minimal use of ballast – rock or ash.”

“Cheers for the last train run.

The last train to Oberon was a sad occasion, but a dozen or so train buffs were at the station to cheer her off.

At 8.30 am yesterday the train left the small Tarana Station headed along its historic 23 kilometre trip to Oberon.

It returned to Tarana around 12.45 pm and later made its way back to Lithgow.

It was the last train to run between Tarana and Oberon ending around 100 years of service to Oberon. Road transport will now take over from the train service.

The Tarana acting station manager said yesterday that the was closing of the train run attracted some attention.

‘We received over 10 calls from people during the week asking about the train and when it would make its last run’, he said.

‘There were some 15 people at the station to see it off on its final journey to Oberon and there were some passengers on the train.

‘They took photograph of the train as well’ he said.

Mr Lionel Peppernell, the station master at Tarana for the past 12 years, is on holidays at present.

However, he made the effort to come back, to be in attendance on the last run.'

Mr Peppernell travelled on the train to Oberon and back...the first time he had done so since he became the station master at Tarana.

Members of the NSW Railway Historical Society were also at the station yesterday morning.

The Tarana – Oberon railway line will still be maintained in case circumstances warrant its re – opening.”

Graham Fletcher wonders how long the line was maintained after closing, with reference to the last paragraph.

A note of thanks from Lachlan Valley Railway.

“Just to let you know that over the last two weeks we have completed the re-sleeping of the section from Cowra to the Lachlan River. We are most grateful for your donation of the fittings for the steel sleepers, without which the job would not have gone ahead. We put in 250 new timber and 150 steel sleepers, all of which went at the Lachlan River end as we discovered there are large infestations of white ants in that area. We hope to run trains over Easter between Cowra and the river, which despite being only 2.5 kms, is at least a destination. We can also run from the station to our Depot which is another kilometre, where we can allow passengers off to inspect our museum.

“FUNDING BOOST TO HERITAGE RAILWAY

A grant of \$172,455 from Stronger Country Communities Fund has been awarded and will be used towards the rebuild the turnaround loop, restoration of Hazelgrove Station and construct a picnic ground at Hazelgrove.

Oberon Tarana Heritage Railway Inc (OTHR) has been working through the process of certification for its locomotives and heritage End Platform Carriages.

President of the OTHR Greg Bourne said they are getting close to returning the railway back to its former glory.

The platform’s looking great and now we’ve got the tracks fixed we can actually shift and move around the locos and carriages.

OTHR estimates that the branch line has the potential to attract between 5000 and 8000 visitors of all ages in its first year of operation.”

Restoration of Headstocks on HLF854 continues at a faster pace.

Headstock replacement on HLF854, is progressing very well although a few unwanted issues have emerged.

So, a cold day in Oberon, just recently, saw all volunteers confined to the relative warmth of the rolling stock shed and workshop.

CBA850 is getting a fresh coat of internal paint while HLF854 End Platform Carriage had one of its headstocks stripped down; metal rails and angles needed and cleaned ready for Rustmasters and Blackjack. There are a few metal and timber issues that can be seen in the images below; nothing that can't be fixed. The other end metals are now rustproofed.

Meanwhile, administration work is also huge for our railway and regulations must be rewritten and updated, so a lot of particularly important work was also performed on our Safety Management System documentation.

OTHR is seeking expressions of interest from members who have the necessary accreditation to drive 73 Class Locomotives or those who would like to learn/train.

Step 1: Your interest should be lodged with the Secretary at admin@othr.com.au

Important information about moving rolling stock: Shunting in the yard will not be frequent but regular as movements are required. Typically shunting would occur in bringing rolling stock to the station for display at open days, special events and rallies.

Medicals:

The level of certification depends on your level of interest.

- Driver Level 1 medical certificate
TMV operator Level 2 medical certificate.
- For all volunteers there is a site induction and further training depending on the type of volunteer assistance you wish to undertake.
- OTHR needs to comply with the guidelines of ONRSR – the Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator and other Laws either Federal or State.


