President's Message

Several working bees have taken place over the Christmas/New Year break and a great deal has been achieved.

- Michael Clark has been putting the final touches to the north end of HLF854. Just a couple of things that needed to be finished to the high standard that he insists on.
- Michael O'Kane has also been preparing the platform under-roof area of the HLF854 and CBA850.
- Deplating sleepers in the yard which make up "the load of sleepers, timbers and sleeper plates" which will be taken to Hazelgrove over this weekend so that the loop can be reinstated during the next week 8th to 12th January. See photo on page 12
- We have got used to Oberon's afternoon thunderstorm. The rain and higher temperatures mean that weed control is becoming more than a burden for the volunteers who are trying to keep the weeds under control. We need more people mowing, whipper snipping and spraying!
- Daily checks of how the cess is working alongside the track Oberon to Hazelgrove are also in place.
 Pooled water can affect the integrity or structure of the formation which can lead to track problems in the future.

2024 is going to be a challenging year. We need to ensure that each section of our SMS documents comply with The Rail Safety National Law and that we have procedures in place to reduce the risks associated with running passenger trains. We have to continue to work on certification "fit for use" for our rolling stock. We will continue with the excellent work that took place during 2023.

Complete Rail, under the leadership, of Jon Bennett has undertaken completion of the loop at Hazelgrove as well as fish plate cleaning and greasing Oberon to Hazelgrove.

The journey also entailed a thorough refurbishment of the carriages both above and below decks.

Saturday 4th December saw the two carriages become "joined at the hip" once more, we would like to think looking better than when they entered service in1897.

There is a bit more work to be done to fully complete the refurbishment at which time they will be pressed into service as our "Café Carriage" once more. Look for more details soon.

Meanwhile one of our Locomotives, 7321, is undergoing a refurbishment as well. It was an ordinary looking caterpillar that is transforming into a beautiful butterfly. It will be emerging soon and will be a joy to see.

The End is in Sight.

You've just read the previous article, so what was the process to get to that stage?

We've given you a rundown over previous newsletters about the process of restoration, and one of the last jobs is detailed here.

A major milestone was reached with HLF854 today with the truss rods turnbuckles fitted and tensioned enabling the removal of the support blocks and jacks. HLF854 is standing by itself once again after its headstock replacement. This has been a huge undertaking by OTHR.

Some Incidents over the Years.

"Lithgow Mercury Friday 3 March 1944:

Approximately a quarter of a mile of railway track on the Oberon line was damaged late on Friday Afternoon when a mixed train, carrying goods and passengers, was derailed two miles from Oberon. Railway Officials state the accident was caused by wood rotting away from beneath cattle stop. This resulted in the rails spreading out of alignment. The wheels of the train cut into 100 sleepers. None of the train crew or passengers was injured., but a girder under the up rail of the cattle stop broke an axe box on the engine. The breakdown van and 25 repairmen from Bathurst reached the scene of the accident at midnight and re-railment operations and repairs to the track were carried out under the supervision of Mr. S.H. McRae, of Lithgow District Superintendent's' office, locomotive engineer of Bathurst and Inspector Hill, of the Way and Work Department. Working under difficulties on the slippery surface of frostcoated ash-banks along the "perway" repair men jettisoned two trucks of sand and had the line open at 4 o'clock on the Saturday morning. Rail traffic was able to resume normal speed at 7 am. Passengers on the train were transported to Oberon in cars."

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"National Advocate, Wednesday 31 March 1948:

Porter's Nasty Accident.

Mt. John Shaw, Junior Porter at Oberon Railway Station, met with a nasty accident at Oberon Railway yards whilst unloading a 44-gallon drum of petrol with the crane. It slipped and knocked him to the ground. The drum fell on his hand, which was badly lacerated. He was taken to Oberon District Hospital for medical attention.

Luckily there were people nearby, who came immediately to his assistance. His condition is satisfactory, and he has been allowed to go home."

"Lithgow Mercury Friday 20 June 1952:

Landslide on Oberon-Tarana Branch Line.

Train services between Oberon and Tarana were held up yesterday by a landslide which swept away the ballast of the line between Carlwood and Hazelgrove.

Railway authorities hoped to have the line back in operation this morning.

The landslide occurred on a mountainside and was discovered about 9.30 am yesterday morning.

The two mixed trains to and from Oberon were immediately cancelled, and arrangements were made to take passengers between Oberon and Tarana by bus to meet the normal schedule.

Two ballast trains worked all day at the scene of the slide."

"Lithgow Mercury Friday 18 November 1921: Oberon Line Accident.

We understand from Mr. Looby, Oberon Coroner, that he has not yet concluded the enquiry into the fatal blasting accident on the Oberon-Tarana railway line construction. Mr. Looby visited the scene of the accident, and a demonstration of battery blasting was given similar to that which preceded the accident. The Coroner then adjourned the enquiry until next Monday".

Oberon....1932.

"Sydney Mail, Wednesday 13 July 1932.

The town of Oberon is 3,700ft above sea level, but the plateau on which it is situated rises to over 4,000 ft in many places. The town itself is a pretty place with a population of several hundreds and some good buildings along its one wide, long street. A clean, spacious-looking town, it is very much exposed to winds from all directions, and because of this and its great elevation, it has a long, cold winter and much snow. It is the terminus of the branch railway line from Tarana, which climbs about 1200 ft in the 15 miles of its winding journey up the mountains. There are many large sheep stations in the district, but the locality is chiefly famous for the production of green peas, apples, and potatoes. Indeed, it is probably the best pea-producing district in Australia.

Since the town is on the highest part of the Great Dividing Range, there are many swampy areas nearby, swamps which are near the watershed separating the eastward-flowing or coastal streams from the westward-flowing or inland streams. These latter streams are small and sluggish just here, but they quickly gain volume and velocity and form well-known trout streams as the Fish, Duckmaloi, and Campbell Rivers, which in turn flow into the Macquarie, Abercrombie, and Lachlan Rivers. The town is a great trout-fishing centre and the "jumping off" place for many enthusiastic fishermen.

The beauty of the surrounding scenery and streams is finding growing favour with tourists. Oberon is only 18 miles by good, but mountainous, roads from Jenolan Caves, while tracks lead to such little-known but magnificent scenic spots as Kanangra Walls and the Oberon Hills. There is also a possible track through Gingkin to the Wombeyan Caves. The lovely city of Bathurst is about 30 miles away. There has been a good deal of alluvial and quartz reef mining about the town; and nearby at Mount Werong, was found the largest diamond yet discovered in Australia. This diamond weighed over 20 carats.

For a quiet holiday in an invigorating climate amid beautiful scenery, there can be no better place that this highland village of Oberon. – Wirrawoo."

Now compare this 1932 description with modern day Oberon found a little later in this newsletter.

Important information about moving rolling stock:

Shunting in the yard will not be frequent but regular as movements are required. Typically shunting would occur in bringing rolling stock to the station for display at open days, special events and rallies.

Medicals:

The level of certification depends on your level of interest.

- Driver Level 1 medical certificate TMV operator Level 2 medical certificate.
- For all volunteers there is a site induction and further training depending on the type of volunteer assistance you wish to undertake.
- OTHR needs to comply with the guidelines of ONRSR – the Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator and other Laws either Federal or State.


