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Presidents Message

September is going to busy preparing for

- A visit by Martin Jones and Marc Miller from ONRSR. They will be running a seminar for committee members and line managers in the last week of the month.
- The October Open Day – we plan to have a locomotive and the two end platform cars at the station – a big move forward for OTHR. Definitely History on the Move!

We will of course continue with track work mainly sleeper replacement in road 3. It is interesting to note that in recent weeks the “fettlers” have replaced 21 sleepers in road 3.

Your committee is working with Canberra to put the allocated grant of \$1.5m in place. We have requested the first drawdown to prepare a scope of works and prepare the paperwork to let tenders.

A round of Transport Heritage New South Wales heritage grants was recently announced. We have applied for a grant to assist in the refurbishment of the undercarriages of the two End Platform Carriages. They need to be certified as “fit for use” as preparation for using them in our tourist operations to Hazelgrove.

The HOL documents were recently returned to OTHR because (NSW) Rail Corporation New South Wales (RailCorp) has changed its name to Transport Asset Holding Entity of New South Wales (TAHE) and is constituted as a statutory state owned corporation, effective 1 July 2020. This name change meant that the final HOL application that was sent early in July had the wrong name. The appropriate changes have been made and sent to John Holland Rail for forwarding to TfNSW (Transport for New South Wales)

Blue September – Fighting Cancer in Men.

Immediate Goals

A new range of goals to be achieved soon as follows:

- 1. Obtain full track certification for the Oberon Yard area.**
- 2. Gain approval for the HOL North of Albion Street to approximately 500m north of the Hazelgrove Station.**
- 3. Apply for variation to existing accreditation for RIM & RSO to approximately 500m north of the Hazelgrove Station.**
- 4. Apply for variation to existing accreditation to operate work trains to Hazelgrove.**
- 5. Apply for variation to existing accreditation to operate tourist trains to Hazelgrove.**

OTHR 10 Year Plan and 15 year Plans.

Following the dissection of the OTHR 5 year plan and what we have achieved, in last month's newsletter, the following is a resume of our plans over the next 15 years.

10 Year Plan to Year 2030

- Obtain HOL for the Oberon Branch line from Hazelgrove to Carlwood.
- Apply for State and Federal funding to restore the line to an operational condition.
- Restore the railway line from Hazelgrove to Carlwood (Just South of Snake Valley Creek Bridge).
- Set a target to run Diesel Locomotive hauled tourist train from Hazelgrove to Carlwood.

15 Year Plan to Year 2035.

- Obtain HOL for the Oberon branch line from Carlwood to Tarana.
- Apply for State and Federal funding to restore the line to an operational condition.
- Restore the line from Carlwood to Tarana.
- Set a target date to run Diesel Locomotive hauled tourist train from Carlwood to Tarana.

Plans are always subjective and often depend on certain circumstances happening. It's for this reason that the plans could be brought forward if financial conditions change.

The committee has always held these plans to the forefront of our operations but end dates can and do change.

A letter to the Editor.

"Good Evening,

Recent receipt of a Copy of the August Newsletter (no, I'm not a Member, but probably should reconsider that) prompts me to offer a few comments.

The Article on Page 7 (photo on 8) entitled "Last Steam Train...." Perked my desire to say something, and suggest that it should probably read "Last Passenger Train...." I'm sure it was diesel-hauled, as indicated by the Number in the Article and your Website Photos.

Perusal of the photos and notes on your Website (including mine – except I'm sure I can't claim the two "black and whites" on "my" page) affirms that the "last Steam Train" ran in 1963; being hauled by two of the stalwarts of the Oberon Line – the Z19 Class steam locomotives, most of which were utilised for shunting duties but some were set up with larger tenders and retained for "specified light branch lines with abnormal grades and curves" – i.e. Oberon, Batlow and Dorrigo.

So, while stirred into action to make this point, I decided I may as well add a few other comments. The Z19 had an Axle Load of around 12 ½ tons, just a fraction higher than the 73 class diesels which will soon be operating on the line.

But the 1800 horsepower "45 Class" diesels, including the one used on the 1974 Train (be careful at this point – there was also one "45" class electric built before the Blue Mountains Electrification, and no relation) came in with an axle load of almost 18 ½ tons. From what I know, the end of the steam days resulted in Oberon services normally being worked by the 875hp "49 Class" with an axle load of just over 13 tons, or 950hp "48", axle load 12 ¼ to 12 ¾ tons.

No wonder Ross Verdich comments that "...the 45 was doing its best to straighten the branch's sharp curves along the way...."! How approval was granted to even attempt to run this train escapes me, but perhaps somebody else "in the know" may wish to comment.

Anyhow, it would have been good to be on the 1974 trip too; but that was not to be.

New Signage for Railway.

Oberon Council has approved new signage for the railway. Council is covering the cost.

Your Committee has decided that we need three signs: one at the North Street entrance, one at the Oberon Stockyards and one on Mutton Fall Road where the railway intersects that road.

A broad design has been approved but wording still to be decided.

The signs should be in place by the end of December 2020.

Sleeper Club

Your Committee has recently reviewed the Sleeper Club that's been in place for many years.

When set up it was a great fund raiser to help with the restoration of the rail line to Hazelgrove.

However, over the years the Club has lost its prominence with only a few people donating.

A review reveals that to purchase and lay a new sleeper in 2020 there is a cost of \$119.00.

In view of the significant increase in sleeper costs over the years, was decided to increase the donation to the Sleeper Club to \$100.00.

This still offers a great way to contribute to our vision of restoring the railway line.

There will never be never ending sleepers to lay as we eventually make our way towards Tarana.

Tarana Signal Box Restored

Paul Toole, State Member for Bathurst, Deputy Leader of NSW National Party, Minister for Decentralisation and Regional Education and OTHR Co-Patron was present last 18th August 2020 for the opening of the newly restored Tarana Signal Box.

“It was great to be at Tarana to inspect the restoration work on the historic signal box and get it looking like it did just over a century ago.

Since it was built in 1916 right through to 1996, this signal box played an important role not just on the railway, but also in the Tarana community.

That’s why we are committed to restoring it, and carrying out essential repair to the station building’s chimneys, roof and drainage.

It’s vital that we celebrate the history of the railway, which continues to play a valuable role in communities right across the Central West whether it be taking customers where they need to go, or moving freight.

We are also exploring the potential for this station precinct to be used for a variety of community purposes.”

Of course, this is the ultimate destination of the Oberon branch line, just as it was from 1923 to 1979 when operations were suspended.

It’s great to see Paul so interested in heritage railway just as he is with the Oberon to Tarana branch line.

Buffers arrive at Oberon.

We have been following leads on buffers for our 73 class locomotive which do not have them. Buffers would enable us to couple direct to our passenger carriages without the use of a match wagon.

A pair of buffers were located at Goulburn Roundhouse Museum and after some phone calls they said we could have them.

I decided to drive to Goulburn to pick them up. Our president Greg came along as well and I said we could bring them back in my station wagon. How wrong was I! Huge and very heavy. Never the less, we had an excellent tour of their facilities and we met the main core group who are a terrific bunch of blokes.

Another trip was planned a week later, this time taking a trailer to carry the treasured items. After another inspection of their locos and rolling stock, and a few hours discussing many situations of ours and theirs, we recovered a pair of buffers that will be fitted to the short end of 7321 allowing us to shunt the carriages directly with the loco when our driver training is completed.

These buffers will now be restored. They had been lying in an S-Truck for a long time and need sandblasting and painting prior to fitting to 7321. The search is still on for 6 more to complete both our locomotives.

Positions Vacant

OTHR also needs skilled tradespersons of all types. For example, Carpenters, Plumbers, Electricians, Boilermakers, Painters plus more.

Important information about moving rolling stock: Shunting in the yard will not be frequent but regular as movements are required. Typically shunting would occur in bringing rolling stock to the station for display at open days, special events and rallies.

Medicals:

The level of certification depends on your level of interest.

Driver Level 1 medical certificate

TMV operator Level 2 medical certificate.

For all volunteers there is a site induction and further training depending on the type of volunteer assistance you wish to undertake.

OTHR needs to comply with the guidelines of ONRSR – the Office of the National Rail Safety Regulator and other Laws either Federal or State.
